



Policy Statement

Volunteers are expected to dress in a manner that is appropriate and professional, but also reflective of the day's responsibilities. Appropriate dress is important for safety during volunteer work and for the representation of FHBB.

Market FOH & BOH, Operations and Drivers

All volunteers working in the market area, sorting room, or warehouse will be expected to wear closed toe shoes, pants or shorts in good repair and taste, and shirts that are comfortable for physical movement. Jeans and T-shirts with work appropriate images are acceptable. When volunteer work is generally performed outside (drivers and operations) or in cold areas (cooler and freezer), volunteers must come in or bring weather/temperature appropriate attire.

Outreach, Special Projects & Skills-Based

The Executive Director and/or Community Connections Manager will discuss appropriate dress for any volunteer who will be representing FHBB at an offsite location such as a presentation, meeting, or community event, for special projects or other tasks for FHBB's day-to-day functions.

Unsafe/Inappropriate Attire

Inappropriate attire includes attire that is not safe for the work performed during a volunteer shift. Examples of unsafe/inappropriate attire include but are not limited to wearing jewelry that can cause a safety hazard when stocking The Market; Wearing tank tops and/or shorts when primarily working in the freezer; coming to a shift with clothing displaying inappropriate messages. The Executive Director reserves the right to determine appropriate work attire. Please check with the Executive Director if you have questions about what is considered inappropriate dress in your volunteer job role.
